Practice It!

Use building blocks to build a tower with your child. Each time you add a block to the tower, talk about one thing that can build trust. Every so often, talk about something that would break trust. Then, knock the tower down. Repeat the activity as desired. Talk with your child about how trust can be built and destroyed.

Here are some discussion points to help you talk about trustworthiness with your child:

• What do you think trustworthiness means and why is it important?

- Do you think you are trustworthy? Why or why not?
- Do you think your friends are trustworthy? Why or why not?
- Tell me about a time when you were tempted to lie or do something that wasn't trustworthy. What happened?
 Has anyone ever lied to you? How did it make you feel?

• Are there any secrets that you shouldn't keep?
